World AIDS Day, Dec. 1, 1987, will recognize the women who have died of AIDS. In the U.S., about 100,000 women have died of AIDS since 1981. The number of women with AIDS has increased 72 percent. But because women with AIDS are frequently not included in national counts, these numbers do not begin to reflect the size of the problem.
